

Patrol Response

The Windsor Police Service is committed to providing 24-hour, uniformed, effective police service to the citizens and visitors of our city. The core functions include crime prevention, law enforcement, assistance to victims of crime, public order maintenance and emergency response.

The Patrol Response section responded to 73,711 calls for service in 2016. Enforcement of municipal, provincial and federal legislation remains a core function of all police services.





The mandate of the Windsor Police Service Emergency 911 Centre is to provide quick, efficient, quality service to those requiring emergency and non-emergency service.

EMERGENCY 911 CENTRE

By Priority

Priority 1: Requires immediate police response

Priority 2: Requires police response not of an urgent nature

Priority 3: Requires police involvement not necessarily police attendance

Priority 4: Scheduled police attendance i.e. school crossing, police escorts, etc

Priority 9: Alternative Reporting via

telephone or CopLogic

Telephone Response Unit & Coplogic

Both TRU and Coplogic were designed to provide members of the community with an alternative method of reporting minor crimes in which there are no safety concerns. The property loss is relatively minor and the presence of a police officer on scene is neither mandatory nor will it advance the investigations.



Community Outreach and Support Team (COAST)



Community Outreach and Support Team (COAST) is a partnership between the Windsor Police Service and the Community Crisis Centre of Hotel Dieu Grace Healthcare. It is a team consisting of a plain clothes police officer and a crisis worker (social worker) who provide on-site crisis and mental health assessments to individuals residing in the city of Windsor, age 16 and over, who are marginalized and vulnerable with complex mental health and psychosocial problems such as untreated mental illness; housing and financial issues; substance abuse; physical health care needs and frequent contact with police and hospital emergency services. The team helps facilitate access to community services and supports in order to divert from the criminal justice system and/or hospital emergency departments. COAST is not an emergency response service. COAST accepts referrals from police, community service providers, concerned friends, family members and citizens.






Motor Vehicle Collisions & Provincial Offense Notices (Tickets)


A total of 5,236 collisions were investigated by the Windsor Police Service, with 62% of the total collisions being reported at the Collision Reporting Centre.


2016 Motor Vehicle Collisions




2016 Provincial Offence Notices Issued








Impaired Driving Enforcement






Property Crime/Criminal Code Occurrences




2016 Property Crime Occurrences







2016 Other Criminal Code Occurrences




Other Criminal Code Definition




Sudden Death




2016 Violent Criminal Violations

- This includes prisoners brought in from the Southwest Detention Centre for court appearances



The Drug and Gun Enforcement Unit is responsible for the investigation of offences that relate to the possession, trafficking, and importation of illegal drugs and firearms including the cultivation and production of narcotics or other illicit drugs as defined by the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act.




